CITIZEN SCIENCE FOR THE FUTURE OF OUR REEFS



World Science Festival Chinchilla
22-23 July 2022, Student day and Community Day,

This event included a static display of CoralWatch items and information alongside my display of underwater drones. Attendees were able to take copies of the standard brochures, factsheets and magnets as well as DVD's and health charts for selected attendees.

What worked well?

- The MBARI video and underwater drone in a fish tank drew attendees to the stand, as did the pull-up banner and CoralWatch sign provided by the WSF organisers.
- The quality brochures and coral specimens then drew attendees towards the CoralWatch information.
- Highlighting the availability of coral on their doorsteps in Moreton Bay and Bundaberg seemed to generate a bit more interest because there was a perception that coral only existed on the reef.

My challenge: The local population was not as interested in coral health as much as they were worried about local water quality issues (gas) due to their inland location and the cost/time required to travel to the coast. This made it difficult to discuss and engage attendees in coral health and monitoring. Maybe we could provide more virtual reef opportunities and experiences to inland populations.

CoralWatch took the reef to the school and interacted with students over four 30 minute sessions. CW inspired, delighted, and informed students with opportunities to virtually monitor corals, play the symbiosis game, test their knowledge with a quiz and challenge themselves with ways to lessen personal environmental footprints.

It works well having the downstairs space, adequate size and tables as well as weather protected. This area also has separate entrance so groups could seamlessly enter and exit.

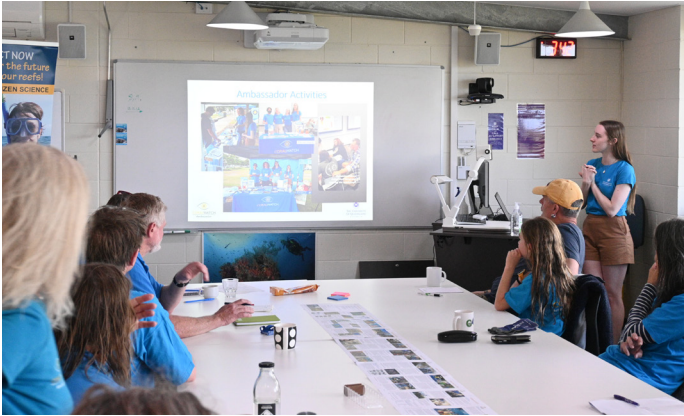

Each ambassador presented on the progress of their project and received feedback from their fellow participants. We also had a variety of breakout sessions where we developed new materials and got feedback. One new idea we came away with was a resource list, documenting all our available materials and a skills catalogue of the strengths of our ambassadors.



Underneath the koalas along the shore of beautiful Minjerribah, ambassadors also had a chance to try out their practical CoralWatch skills with a snorkel along the Amity Point wall. What worked well?

- Shopping at the fruit barn in Cleveland prior to boarding
- Research House as the accommodation and dining hub.
- Self-catering worked well and became a community event.
- Use of Biological Science's Troupie as the main transport vehicle and utilising the MBRS vehicle as the second car for transport to Amity Wall snorkel.
- Having a cross selection of Ambassadors represented. We had our newest Ambassadors returning to look back at past events and activities, joined by Ambassadors from previous years who were instrumental in sharing their wealth of experiences and ideas
- Crowdsourcing amongst the ambassadors to find great new ideas and solve tough problems.

Challenges

The video is asking questions, such as How many different types of corals can you spot in this picture? Is this a soft coral? You will then get some time to think before the answer appears. Our Ambassador 2023 team come from the following locations: Townsville (1), Bundaberg (2), Hervey Bay (2), Brisbane (6), Sydney (1), Canberra (1), South Australia (1) and Taiwan (1).

Their daily life activities vary from UQ student (2), UQ Post Doc (2), ANU student (1), QLD Health Worker (1), artist (1), teacher (1), professional Film Maker (1), ecotourism manager (1), ecotourism guide (1), Turtle Ranger (1), project manager (1), museum staff, Taiwan (1), fisheries scientist (1).

Luckily this year we were less restricted by COVID and able to engage with the resort. We organised activities for our Ambassadors to practice new skills talking to real people at reefwalks, and a presentation at the resort. - Community presentations, talk corals in Bundaberg area
- A collaboration between SEQUEST and CoralWatch to discuss the health of the Moreton Bay and GBR, and why these ecosystems are important with presentations at schools.
- 'Watch Coral, Watch my home' Continuation and expansion of CoralWatch in Taiwan
- Using social media tools to raise awareness about Corals Importance.
- Beach tours in South Australia, talking about the importance of the GBR and connectivity
- CoralWatch and Robogals Canberra collaboration, with STEM activities for Microplastics and Coral Reefs
- Coral project on i-Naturalist for Sydney corals, raising awareness about local reefs

To give senior high school students an insight into studying science at UQ, UQ offers several times a year ‘Experience Science’ events, demonstrating how science is applied in industry and everyday life through hands-on activities and interactive workshops, including CoralWatch.

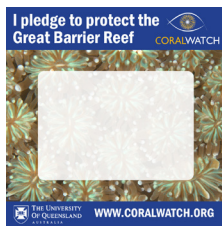

Often we organise a sustainability component in our workshops. These fridge magnets are great for high school activities and events to take a pledge for the reef.



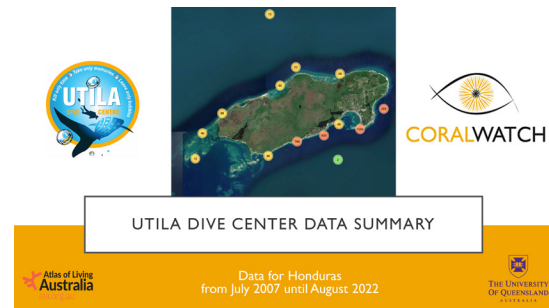
CoralWatch Resource List

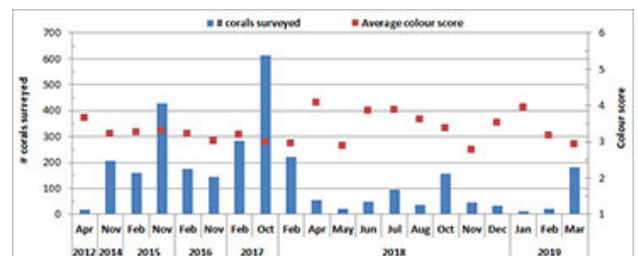
Limited edition of rashies available

Data reports

With the help of volunteer Elena we have analysed the data of some of our big users such as Utila Dive Centre in Honduras, Black Turtle Dive and Coral Tribe in Thailand. Utila has been active since July 2007, they offer CoralWatch as part of the divemaster program and conduct fortnightly surveys. The [reports](#) provides an overview of the most common sites, average colour score over time, coral type distribution, relationship between temperature and coral health score and indicates if there have been any bleaching events. 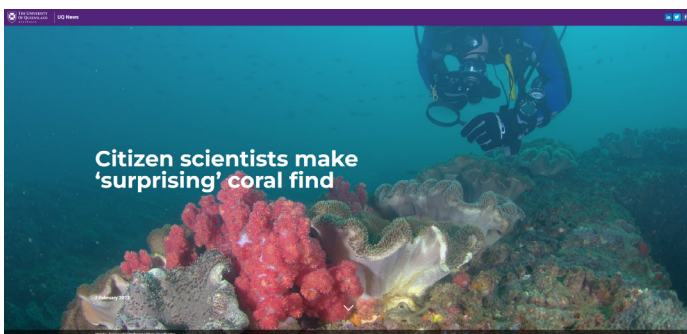

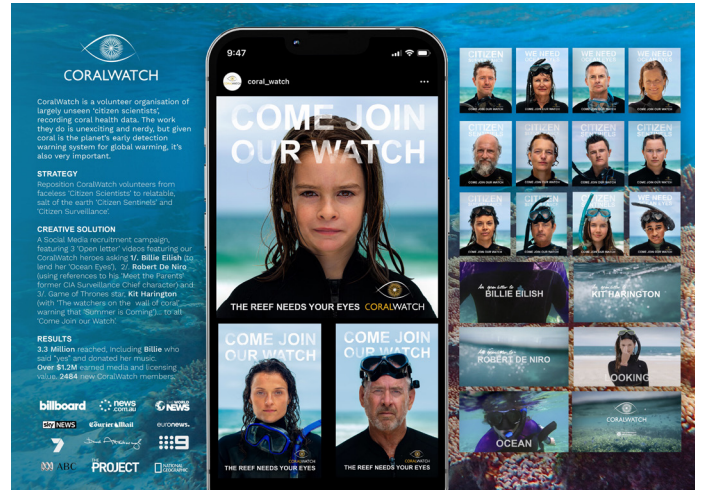


UQ Online News Citizen scientist make 'surprising' coral find, 7 February 2023
