Heron Island Alumni Event 10-12 March 2023, Heron island

The Heron Island Research Station, the oldest and largest marine research station on the Great Barrier Reef, became the centre of attention in March as it hosted a behind the scenes event for UQ alumni. Alumni joined UQ's marine scientists in (swimming, snorkelling) and out of the water (reef walks) to learn about the challenges facing this iconic marvel of nature.

The event was organised by UQ Alumni and Advancement Team, UQ research station staff, and CoralWatch. Several CoralWatch ambassadors helped preparing the station, and conducted snorkel-, reefwalking and turtle tours. Elijah gave a fantastic presentation about his journey as ambassador and how you can help the reef and Diana gave a presentation about the 'Secret World of Corals', followed by a reefwalk.

Hands-on Art Experience

People young and old joined in to get creative and contribute to making 1,000 coral polyps for the Living Together community art project. With no artistic skills required, the enthusiasm and enjoyment was palpable. And what better setting to make art than on a tropical island surrounded by the best of mother nature. Approximately 25 people joined in to cut and sculpt plastic water bottles. We then made "spirulina smoothies" inside each polyp, to coat the surface with a green pigment. This pigment fades through sun exposure, just as corals can bleach when exposed to UV rays. This was the first of many workshops to come, with the final outcome to be displayed at the SWELL Sculpture Festival (September) and Logan Art Gallery (December-January 2024).
